### **ATTENTION DEFICIT HYPERACTIVITY DISORDER IN CHILDREN**

Attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) is a behavioral syndrome characterized by persistent and developmentally inappropriate levels of inattention, impulsiveness and hyperactivity. The literature indicates that ADHD is one of the most common childhood mental disorders affecting between 3-5% of school aged children, predominantly boys. Its impact on U.S. society is considerable in terms of financial cost, stress to families, disruption in schools and its potential for leading to criminality and substance abuse. Research indicates that the combination of psychostimulant medication and behavior therapy is considered to be the most effective treatment of ADHD children. NIMH is currently sponsoring a Collaborative Multimodal Treatment Study of children with ADHD.

### HEALTH CARE DELIVERY AND NATIVE AMERICANS

The Indian Health Service (IHS) provides a comprehensive health service delivery system for approximately 1.4 million of the nation's two million American Indians and Alaska Natives who live mainly on reservations and in rural communities. IHS strives for maximum tribal involvement in meeting the needs of its service population. Its goal is to raise their health status to the highest level. In order to carry out this mission, IHS assists tribes in the development and evaluation of

health programs, provides preventive and ambulatory medical care, and serves as the principal Federal advocate to ensure comprehensive health services. Current selected literature discusses the use of health services, substance abuse, cancer screening, domestic violence, nutrition and mental health issues affecting this population.

## MANAGED BEHAVIORAL CARE (MBC) AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT

Managed behavioral care programs are helping businesses, hospitals and other health care providers reinvent substance abuse treatment. The literature suggests that managed behavioral care can provide administrative functions like financial and utilization reviews while maintaining direct patient care without overburdening the health care worker. The popularity of such managed behavioral care programs has grown in the past five years. Research indicates that in 1992, 61 million individuals were enrolled in MBC programs while in 1996, 105 million people were enrolled in such programs. SAMHSA is currently helping health care organizations implement and review managed behavioral care programs in their institutions.

## PATIENT RECORD CONFIDENTIALITY OVER THE INTERNET

Patient medical records are now being transmitted electronically via the Internet. Although permission may be legally obtained through the patient's signed release, there is a growing potential risk of unauthorized access and accompanying threat of a security lapse. The literature describes the issue of electronic records, encryption methods, and how privacy issues are being addressed. The Agency for Health Care Policy and Research has recently funded a study which proposes a standard for protecting the confidentiality of patient information over the Internet.

### TEEN SEX AND CONDOM USE

According to the National Center for Health Statistics' 1995 National Survey of Family Growth, the number of teenagers who are sexually active has declined slightly and the use of contraception, especially the condom, at first intercourse has increased dramatically. Condom use at first intercourse has tripled since the 1970's from 18% to 54%. The increase in condom use and the decline in teen sexual activity may be responsible for the leveling off and recent decline in the teenage birth rate. The National Center for Health Statistics reports an 8% drop in the teen birth rate from 1991 to 1995.
