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**COMPUTER COMPLIANCE IN THE YEAR 2000**

The Year 2000 (Y2K) problem refers to the need to change all existing date-sensitive computer software, hardware and firmware to successfully conduct transactions at the turn of the century. The problem is caused by the common programming practice of representing each year by its last two digits in the storage and processing of computer data. Use of these last two digits alone does not allow for the distinction between the year 1900 and the year 2000. If left unchanged, this will result in the rejection of legitimate entries, the computation of erroneous results, and/or complete system failure in transactions conducted on January 1, 2000 and beyond.

The Year 2000 Interagency Committee was chartered by the Office of Management and Budget in 1995 to address this issue. It is estimated that the work required to fix this problem in the federal sector will cost \$30 billion. In September 1996 this Committee, working through the General Services Administration, developed a Y2K warranty clause for both commercial and non-commercial sources that requires that all computer hardware, software and firmware be capable of accurately processing date-related data from, into and between the 20th and 21st centuries.

### **CHILD CARE SERVICES**

The President has announced an initiative to improve child care for America's working families by increasing the investments in child care programs to \$20 billion over a five year period. This amount will double the number of children receiving child care subsidies in the Child Development Block Grant which is managed by the Health Resources and Services Administration. It also will establish an Early Learning Fund which will promote early learning for those in the 0 to 5 age group. In addition, increased tax credits, the provision of after school care, and improved child

safety and quality of services will help working parents find and pay for care that is reliable, affordable, and trustworthy.

### NATIVE AMERICAN MENTAL HEALTH

It has been estimated that at least 10 million Native Americans once lived throughout the United States. Today Native Americans number approximately 1.8 million or about 0.08% of the U.S. population. The literature indicates that as a result of oppression, cultural breakdown, unemployment, poor education and poverty, the lives of many American Indians are affected by alcoholism, depression, suicide, family violence or emotional disorders. Consequently the need for immediate and ongoing mental health services among this population is great. Research indicates, however, that there are many factors preventing Native Americans from accessing these services such as a lack of awareness of mental health service availability, poor English language skills, long geographic distances to services and the lack of culturally sensitive mental health

providers. Therefore, American Indians frequently use traditional healers for their mental health needs. NIMH is currently funding studies investigating the prevalence of mental illness among Native Americans.

## SUBSTANCE ABUSE AND IMPAIRED DRIVERS

In the United States alcohol and drug related traffic accidents kill an average of 17,000 persons and cost roughly \$100 billion annually. The literature indicates that after alcohol, tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) and tranquilizers are the two most common substances found in impaired drivers systems. Since reliable drug detection in the field is almost impossible many law enforcement officials, organizations and researchers have focused on Blood-Alcohol-Content (BAC) to recognize impaired drivers on the spot. Research suggests that drivers with BAC of .15 percent and over are 300 to 600 times more likely to be killed in an automobile crash than non-

drinking drivers. NIDA is currently investigating the effects that drugs have on skills used in motor vehicle operation.

## SUDDEN INFANT DEATH AND MATERNAL SMOKING

Sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS) has received considerable epidemiologic attention. SIDS is the leading cause of postneonatal mortality in the United States. These deaths occur in infants younger than 1 year and remain unexplained after a complete postmortem investigation. Numerous studies indicate that maternal cigarette smoking during pregnancy increases the risk of sudden infant death syndrome. Smoking is one of the most important preventable risk factors for this syndrome. The literature suggests that smoking prevention programs have the potential to substantially lower SIDS rates in the United States.
