**ASIAN-AMERICAN AND PACIFIC ISLANDER (AAPI)  
HEALTH**

During the past two decades, AAPIs have comprised the fastest-growing racial/ethnic group in the U.S. This ethnically diverse group currently represents 4% of the U.S. population and is projected to reach 10% by the year 2050. Despite this growth, adequate data on the health status of AAPIs are not available, and no data system has been developed to systematically monitor the health status of AAPI populations.

To correct this deficiency, the Deputy Secretary/DHHS established the AAPI Initiative Departmental Working Group (DWG) in June 1997. The purpose of the DWG was to examine AAPI programs and services, and to make recommendations for an AAPI Action Agenda. Based on this Agenda, the DWG this year promulgated an agency-specific implementation plan to improve the health and welfare of AAPI's in the following six areas: (1) access and utilization of health and human services, (2) data collection, analysis and dissemination, (3) health research projects, (4) participation in HHS-sponsored training, (5) workforce and participation in HHS operations, and (6) cross-cutting collaboration to enhance HHS customer service to AAPIs.

The program provides activities that help children grow mentally, emotionally, socially, and physically. In direct support of these goals, the bureau is currently studying head start children's social competence, the effects of welfare reform, state by state quality issues, immigration, community influences, and the delivery of health services.

### THE NIMH DIAGNOSTIC INTERVIEW SCHEDULE

The Diagnostic Interview Schedule (DIS) was designed by NIMH for use in its Epidemiologic Catchment Area (ECA) Program, a study that required interviews of 20,000 persons of different educational and social backgrounds located in various sites throughout the U.S. It is an interviewing instrument that combines the use of a highly structured interview with a format for gathering information about specific diagnoses according to specified criteria. This combination

results in a schedule that takes about an hour to administer by lay interviewers and is both acceptable and understandable to most subjects. The responses are analyzed by a computer program specifically prepared for this purpose. The DIS has become the chief instrument of contemporary studies in psychiatric epidemiology and is now being used in growing numbers of U.S. and international studies as shown by the articles below.

## PHYSICAL ACTIVITY AND FITNESS

The terms physical activity and physical fitness are often used interchangeably. Physical activity is any bodily movement that results in energy expenditure above basal rate. It is frequently measured in populations as household leisure time, occupational, recreational and activities of daily living. Physical fitness is the ability to carry out daily tasks with vigor, alertness and without undue fatigue. It is often measured by cardiorespiratory endurance, skeletal muscle strength, power, speed, agility, and balance. Physical activity has proven to have protective effects for several chronic diseases, including coronary heart disease, hypertension, colon cancer, depression and anxiety. According to a National Center for Health Statistics' publication, Healthy People 2000 Review 1997: (1) physically active people outlive those who are inactive, (2) regular physical activity helps in maintaining the functional independence of older adults, and (3) physical activity also enhances the quality of life for people of all ages.

## THYROID FUNCTION TESTS RECONSIDERED

Physicians currently prescribe two routine thyroid function tests, the free thyroxine test and the thyrotropin test. The literature indicates that the recommended procedure is to use the free thyroxine test prior to the more costly thyrotropin test. However, recent laboratory improvements have reduced and equalized the direct costs of these tests suggesting the need to reconsider this sequence. Current research funded by AHCPR reveals that obtaining both tests together overcomes the disadvantages of each with only a slight increase in cost.
