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BALANCING WORK AND FAMILY LIFE

Women and single parents are among the fastest growing segments of the working population. In addition, current employees of the 'baby boom' generation must often meet the needs of both aging parents and their own children. For these reasons, many organizations have recently established on-site resources to assist employees in balancing the competing demands of work and family life.

In 1997 DHHS established the Work/Life Center in Suite 1250 of the Switzer Building in Washington DC to serve as a 'one-stop' access point offering employee assistance, career management, a stress reduction lab, and a variety of work/family services that include individual counseling, seminars, support groups, and a resource library. The Parklawn Health Library is currently acquiring books, journals, reports, and audiovisual materials to establish an on-site 'Work and Family Life Resource Collection' for Departmental staff located at the Parklawn complex in suburban Maryland.

MANAGED BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARE

Managed behavioral health care (mbhc) is a relatively new and rapidly evolving area in the field of managed care. The literature indicates that managed behavioral health care will be the dominant system for the delivery of mental health services by the turn of the century. If done well, it could improve care for a vulnerable population by providing quality based purchasing, nondiscriminatory benefits for mental health services and effective forms of advocacy for the mentally ill. If done poorly, it could be a public health disaster by limiting hospital care, by failing to engage patients and their families in treatment planning, and by preventing patient access to new antipsychotic medications. Research indicates that the development of practice guidelines and outcome measures is necessary to determine the quality of managed behavioral health care. The Center for Mental Health Services, SAMHSA is testing a Consumer-Oriented Report Card to determine the quality of care provided to consumers by mbhc organizations.

PHYSICIAN PRACTICE PATTERNS IN MANAGED CARE

More than half of Americans are currently enrolled in managed care organizations (MCOs). The cost controls that make MCOs appealing as a public policy measure may jeopardize both patient access to and quality of care. For this reason, the Agency for Health Care Policy and Research is currently examining publications that investigate financial arrangements and contractual agreements between MCOs and physicians, as well as those that address how MCOs decide which medical technologies they will cover.

TEENAGE PREGNANCY

Teenage pregnancy is recognized as one of the most critical social issues in the United States. Each year, one out of ten females aged 15 to 19 becomes pregnant. There are also a number of documented complications and consequences for the pregnant teenagers, their children, families and society. According to the National Center for Health Statistics, 500,000 teenagers give birth every year in America. Most of these are unmarried and many are not ready for the emotional, psychological, and financial responsibilities and challenges of parenthood. A recent National Center for Health Statistics' report entitled, "Teenage Births United States: National and State Trends, 1990-96," indicates that the teenage birth rate has declined in all states and that rates for

black teenagers have dropped more than for any other population group.

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TEMPORARY ASSISTANCE TO NEEDY FAMILIES

The Administration for Children and Families administers the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program which was created by welfare reform in 1996. TANF replaced what was then commonly referred to as welfare, Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC), and the Job Opportunities and Basic Skills Training Program (JOBS). TANF provides assistance and work opportunities to needy families by granting states the federal funds and wide flexibility to develop and implement their own welfare programs.
