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BIOTERRORISM

Until recently, there has been little threat of bioterrorism. With the events of the last few years in Iraq and Japan, however, the threat of bioterrorism has become a subject of escalating concern in the United States. Bioterrorism ranges from hoaxes and the utilization of non-mass casualty devices by individuals to state-sponsored terrorism that employs biological warfare agents that can produce mass casualties. The biological agents of anthrax, smallpox, brucellosis and viral hemorrhagic fevers are of particular concern. These agents are easy and inexpensive to produce, cause death or disabling disease and can be distributed over large geographic areas. If released, they can infect hundreds of thousands of people and cause a multitude of deaths.

To confront the problems posed by bioterrorism, \$133 million has been appropriated to DHHS in fiscal year 1999. Approximately \$51 million of this is to be spent on an emergency stockpile of antibiotics and vaccines. Most of the remaining funds are to be used for strengthening the infectious disease surveillance networks and for enhancing the capacity of federal and state laboratories.

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CHILDHOOD ASTHMA

Asthma is the most frequent chronic respiratory disease in children, affecting 4.8 million children. The literature indicates that one method to effectively control and prevent this disease is self-management training of both the child and family. Self-management programs for asthmatic children reduce hospitalization, emergencies, and severity of attack. Self-management depends upon accurate symptom perception and evaluation. Research indicates that inaccuracies in symptom perception have contributed greatly to morbidity and mortality in childhood asthma. In addition to self-management training, adequate medical treatment, environmental control and education improve the quality of life for asthmatic children. The NCHS has recently published data on childhood asthma in its annual publication, Health U.S.

CHIROPRACTIC VERSUS MEDICAL EDUCATION

Chiropractic is the largest alternative healthcare profession in the United States. Until recently, little attention has been given to the similarities and differences in the curriculum of chiropractic education versus allopathic medical education. The literature indicates that considerable commonality exists between chiropractic and medical programs. In the basic sciences, both programs are similar in the types of subjects offered and the time allotted to each subject. Similarities also exist in the clinical sciences. Research indicates that the greatest differences occur in the area of clinical practice which in medical school far exceeds that in chiropractic school. In addition, the therapies that chiropractic and medical students learn are different from one another as are the settings in which the students receive their clinical training. AHCPR has recently supported a study comparing chiropractic and medical education.

EVIDENCE BASED MEDICINE IN MANAGED CARE

Evidence Based Medicine (EVB) is the cautious and conscientious use of current best evidence in making decisions about the care of individual patients. It respects clinical discernment, the circumstances of the patient, and their preferences. Research indicates that in the managed care environment EVB is challenged as the demand increases for financial accountability and quality of care. The transition to managed care has occurred with noticeable impact on both health care services and its quality. HRSA's division of managed care has instituted a task force to examine the impact of EVB on managed care.

GENETICS AND DRUG ADDICTION

Scientists are finding that a genetic predisposition to drug addiction runs in families. The literature indicates that relatives of drug abusers are eight times more likely to abuse drugs than relatives of those who are not drug abusers. Studies show that vulnerability to drug abuse and addiction involves many different genes. Investigations are now underway to identify the genes which play a role in addiction by studying the genes of animals. Research indicates that by studying twins, adoptees and families, scientists will be able to learn more about the role of genetics and environment in drug abuse. By learning more about the role of genetics in substance abuse, treatments can be tailored to an individual's genetic makeup. NIDA recently launched the Vulnerability to Addiction Initiative which addresses the issues of genetics and drug abuse and addiction.

WOMEN'S MENTAL HEALTH

Women's mental health is currently defined as the biology, behavior, mood, perception, and cognition associated with specific conditions of women or with situations that have substantial gender differences. The literature indicates that women's mental health is a newly developing field that needs to be well delineated. There is a lack of consensus on definitions and diagnostic criteria. Standardized clinical assessment procedures need to be developed. Research indicates the necessity for large-scale interdisciplinary collaborative efforts to effectively study and clarify the diversified aspects of this field. With the evolution in molecular biology, genetics, and endocrinology and a better understanding of environment-body-brain interactions, a new era in the field of women's mental health is under way. NIMH is currently funding research to investigate various areas of women's mental health.
