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COMPUTER COMPLIANCE IN THE YEAR 2000 - UPDATE

The Year 2000 (Y2K) problem refers to the need to change all existing date-sensitive computer software and hardware to successfully conduct transactions at the turn of the century. The problem is caused by the common programming practice of representing each year by its last two digits in the storage and processing of computer data. Use of these two digits alone does not allow for the distinction between the year 1900 and the year 2000. If left unchanged, this will result in the rejection of legitimate entries, the computation of erroneous results, and/or complete system failure in transactions conducted on January 1, 2000.

During the past year, HHS has made Year 2000 (Y2K) computer preparedness its highest management priority. The department is making certain that its own computer systems will function correctly when the new millenium begins January 1, 2000. Currently all HHS mission critical systems are Y2K compliant. In addition, HHS is working with states to ensure that state-administered programs like Medicaid, Temporary Assistance to Needy Families, child welfare and health insurance, and public health surveillance programs are prepared for the year 2000.

HRSA's CHILD HEALTH PROGRAMS

The leading health risk for children is not a disease or a medical condition but poverty. The literature indicates that poverty can contribute to poor nutrition, limit access to quality health care, and create living conditions not conducive to good health. HRSA, the "Access Agency", has created programs to address these issues which include infant mortality, access to health care, immunization, HIV/AIDS, abstinence education, provider training/competency, and genetic services. These programs are administered by the following four bureaus: the Bureau of Health Professions, the Bureau of Primary Health Care, the HIV/AIDS Bureau, and the Maternal and Child Health Bureau. Research suggests that health services to this population must be comprehensive, coordinated, community based, culturally competent, and family centered.

NIMH EPIDEMIOLOGIC CATCHMENT AREA SURVEY

The NIMH Epidemiologic Catchment Area (ECA) Survey, carried out in the early 1980's, is the largest, most comprehensive personal interview survey of psychiatric disorders ever conducted in the U.S. The ECA survey provides data about the prevalence of psychiatric disorders, risk factors and service utilization. The survey sample involves over 20,000 community and institutional residents from 5 mental health catchment areas: New Haven, Connecticut; Baltimore, Maryland; St. Louis, Missouri; Durham, North Carolina and Los Angeles, California. Recently, data from

the ECA survey was analyzed to estimate the parameters of the natural history of panic disorder.

NATIONAL HOUSEHOLD SURVEY ON DRUG ABUSE

The 1998 National Household Survey on Drug Abuse, an annual survey conducted by SAMHSA, has recently reported preliminary findings on drug use in the United States. This survey is the primary source of estimates of the prevalence and incidence of illicit drug, alcohol, and tobacco use in the population. The survey is based on a nationally representative sample of the civilian, noninstitutionalized population of the United States 12 years of age and older. The literature

indicates that drug use in the U.S. remains level. However, the rate of drug use among youths may be leveling off or possibly starting to decrease. Nevertheless, estimated rates of youth initiation of marijuana and heroin use remains at historically high levels. Research indicates that in terms of prevention, there is an obvious need to focus immediate attention on children and adolescents. In the long run, the expanding pool of young people using illicit drugs will probably result in continuing pressure on the substance abuse treatment system in future years, as many new drug users progress to addiction and require intervention.

NURSING HOMES

Nursing homes are defined as institutions which provide continuous nursing and other services to individuals who are not acutely ill, but need nursing and personal services as inpatients. The literature indicates that selection of a nursing home by a family member or friend is a difficult task. Some of the criteria to look for in choosing a good nursing home include: correct licensing by the state, number of physicians and nurses on staff, cost, location, facility size, food preparation and morale of the patients. Research indicates that there are 17,000 nursing homes in the United States with a estimated total of 1.8 million beds and 1.7 million residents. NCHS is currently publishing data on nursing homes from their 1997 National Nursing Home Survey.
