The Parklawn Health Library System is comprised of the following components: (1) Parklawn Health Library, (**Main Library**) Rm 13-12, Parklawn Building, Rockville, MD, (2) National Center for Health Statistics Staff Research Library, (**SRL**) Rm 1169, Metro III, Hyattsville, MD, and (3) Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality Information Resources Center, (**IRC**) Suite 501, Executive Office Center, Rockville, MD.

The library plans, develops, and administers a national research collection and innovative information programs in direct support of the Department of Health and Human Services. The primary focus of the **Main Library's** collection includes: delivery of health care, health administration, health policy, health promotion/disease prevention, health services research, public health, substance abuse, mental health, and management. The **SRL** regularly collects material on epidemiology, statistics, and survey research methodology. The **IRC** develops its collection with particular emphasis on quality of health care, patient safety and medical errors, outcomes research, health economics, health services research, evidence-based practice, and health care delivery services.

With a federal staff of 14 employees (10 of whom have each acquired over 15 years of experience with the Parklawn Health Library), we provide a full-range of library services and products to our customers. 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BONE DENSITY

Bone density is defined as the amount of bone tissue in a certain volume of bone. It is measured using a special x-ray called a quantitative computed tomogram. Decreased bone density is associated with advancing age. NCHS has collected data on bone density in their NHANES Survey.

The American Indian and Alaska Native population experience a high level of health problems as compared to other Americans. The Indian Health Service provides comprehensive health services through tribally contracted hospitals and health centers. Special program concentrations are in disease prevention and health promotion, alcoholism, drug abuse, suicide, accidents, maternal and

child health, nutrition, and otitis media.

Health care quality is a measure of health care provided by a system, person or organization. It is concerned with the degree of conformity to health care standards and focuses on efficiency, efficacy, access, and patient satisfaction. AHRQ has recently funded a study in which scientists

QUALITY OF MENTAL HEALTH CARE

Despite recent advances in pharmacological and psychosocial treatments for mental disorders, the

quality of care for psychiatric disorders is still moderate to poor in the U.S. Currently there is no data to determine which population groups are at greatest risk for not receiving appropriate care. NIMH is funding research on the quality of care in the treatment of depression.

SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT FOR NATIVE AMERICANS

Nearly 20% of American Indian and Alaska Native teenagers use illicit drugs. In addition, alcohol-related deaths for these groups is 17 times higher than the national average. SAMHSA is addressing these concerns in an initiative which integrates Native American values and mainstream substance abuse treatment in order to reverse these trends.
