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## ALZHEIMER DISEASE

Alzheimer disease is a progressive neurologic disorder characterized by changes in behavior, personality, judgment, and the ability to perform usual activities. Its prevalence increases with age, doubling every five years between 60 and 85. NCHS has current data on Alzheimer disease in *Healthy People 2010*.

## CULTURAL COMPETENCE

Lack of awareness about cultural differences can make it difficult for both health care providers and patients to achieve the best, most appropriate care. In spite of similarities, fundamental differences among people arise from nationality, ethnicity, and culture. These differences affect health beliefs, practices, and behavior on the part of both patient and health care provider. It also influences the expectations that patient and health care provider have of each other. The Minority and Women's Health Program, HRSA, stimulates collaborative partnerships to ensure coordinated health care that responds to unique cultural and linguistic needs.

## DRUG USE AND MINORITIES

By the year 2030, racial/ethnic minorities are expected to constitute one-half of the student population in the U.S. Because minorities, particularly African Americans and Hispanics, often are concentrated in central city areas where their lives are marked by poverty, illiteracy, malnutrition, and other unhealthy environmental conditions, they may be more at risk for drug abuse. This September, NIDA will host a symposium entitled "Bridging Science and Culture to Improve Drug Abuse Research in Minority Communities."

Rural areas suffer from a deficit of mental health services. Lack of adequate professional staffing is the biggest problem confronting rural mental health service delivery. Telepsychiatry offers a solution to providing services to rural populations. NIMH is currently

funding research on the acceptability of telepsychiatry to people living in rural areas.
