The National Family Caregiver Support Program, AOA, provides funding support to states to help families who care for the elderly in their home. 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HOMELESS PERSONS AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE

Homelessness is a major public health problem in the U.S. Many homeless persons have mental

disorders and are substance abusers with crack cocaine and alcohol being the most commonly abused substances. Health services rendered to the homeless should include substance abuse counseling and rehabilitation. In April 2002, HRSA and SAMHSA are holding a conference in Boston to address the problems of homelessness and substance abuse.

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OVARIAN CANCER

Ovarian cancer is defined as a malignant neoplasm located on the ovaries. In the year 2000, approximately 23,000 new cases of ovarian cancer were diagnosed and 14,000 women died of this disease making ovarian cancer the fifth leading cause of cancer death among women. Routine gynecologic pelvic examinations are the most important way to decrease the overall risk of ovarian cancer. NCHS has published data on survival rates from ovarian cancer in their annual publication, *Health, United States, 2001*.

TWIN STUDIES IN MENTAL HEALTH RESEARCH

Research on twins, one of whom is affected by a mental disorder, is a means of providing information on how genetics and the environment influence the development of psychiatric disorders. Valid twin studies require (a) an unbiased sample; (b) an accurate determination of zygosity; and (c) a disorder that does not occur more often in twins than in single births. Research suggests there is a genetic basis for a disorder when monozygotic twins have a high coincidence rate for the disorder while dizygotic twins have a coincidence rate not significantly different from siblings. NIMH is currently supporting twin research in schizophrenia and depression.
