**ONLINE CATALOG**

The online catalog contains books, journals, technical reports, newsletters, and statistical publications found in the Parklawn Health Library System. It can be accessed through the library's web site at <http://library.psc.gov>. At the home page, choose "Catalog" and then click on "Access the Online Catalog."

A search can now be performed by author, title, subject, technical report number or call number. In addition, a more advanced search can tailor the retrieval by words in the title, year, material type, library location, and publisher. Once an item is found in the catalog, the record will indicate whether it is charged out and which library holds the item (**MAIN LIB** = Parklawn; **BRANCH LIB** = NCHS Staff Research Library; **AHRQ** = Information Resources Center.)

Additional services available through the library's online catalog include: (1) request interlibrary loans\*, (2) view circulation record, and (3) renew items. These services require the bar code number on the back of the client's library card.

## ADOLESCENT SUICIDE ATTEMPTS

Adolescent suicide attempts are a significant public health problem in the U.S. The rates of suicide attempts by adolescents are steadily increasing making suicide the third leading cause of mortality among 13-19 year olds. Factors that contribute to adolescent suicide attempts include depression, substance abuse, low self-esteem, hopelessness, and family conflict/disruption. For adolescent suicide attempters, more active follow-up and adequate aftercare are needed if repetition and risk of suicide are to be reduced. NIMH is currently funding research on gender differences in adolescent suicide attempts.

Hospitals play a critical role in both identifying and responding to any potential bioterrorism attack or disease outbreak. HRSA will provide funding to states for the creation of regional hospital plans to respond in the event of a bioterrorism attack. This funding will be used to improve facilities, ready hospital systems to deal with large numbers of casualties, expand public health laboratory and communications capacities, and improve connectivity between hospitals and city, local, and state health departments to enhance disease reporting.

## CIRRHOSIS

Cirrhosis of the liver, the eighth leading cause of death in the U.S., is a chronic, degenerative disease that occurs when normal liver cells are damaged and then replaced by scar tissue. It can be caused by heavy alcohol consumption, chronic hepatitis C virus infection, prescription drugs, and some herbal medicines. NCHS has published data on cirrhosis in *Healthy People 2010*.

### COST EFFECTIVENESS OF DENTAL SEALANTS

Dental sealants are a coating material capable of mechanically bonding to the surface of a tooth and offering protection against outside chemical or physical agents to prevent tooth decay. AHRQ has recently funded a study that found dental sealants were an effective tool in preventing tooth decay and thereby lowering costs for children enrolled in Medicaid dental programs.

### METHADONE ACCREDITATION

Opiate addicts who are employed often find that the hours of methadone clinics do not fit in with their work schedules. Many times clinics are open only from 9:00 to 5:00 with long lines. Also, employed opiate addicts often prefer to receive treatment from their personal physician instead of visiting the clinic. In addition, many neighborhoods prefer not to have methadone clinics nearby. For the reasons mentioned above, SAMHSA is working to accredit methadone treatment programs which will move treatment into the private sector and make the treatment part of mainstream medicine.
