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INTERLIBRARY LOAN

A primary client* in need of materials not owned by the Parklawn Health Library System can obtain these materials through interlibrary loan (ILL). There are two ways to initiate an ILL request without visiting the library: (1) by accessing the library's web site or (2) through Lonesome Doc.

The library's web site may be accessed at <http://library.psc.gov> Once at the home page, click on the link for ILL. Next choose the type of material to borrow (i.e., book, journal article, report, etc). After agreeing to a copyright compliance statement, the request form is ready to be filled out. **IN ORDER FOR THE REQUEST TO BE PROCESSED, THE 14 DIGIT PATRON BARCODE NUMBER (located on the back of the patron ID card) MUST BE INCLUDED.** To obtain an ID card, contact the library (see below). Please allow adequate time when making requests as delivery time varies with difficulty of requests.

ILL requests may also be made through Lonesome Doc. This service allows the primary client to order copies of articles from the library while searching PUBMED. In order to use Lonesome Doc, the client must contact the library to obtain the Library Identifier (LIBID). Registration can then be completed online at <http://wwwcf.nlm.nih.gov/loansome/login.cfm>

Arthritis is defined as inflammation of the joints. It is one of the most common health conditions in the U.S. affecting more than 43 million Americans. Arthritis has a significant impact on public health since it is the leading cause of disability. As such, it limits major life activities for nearly 3% of the entire U.S. population. NCHS has published data on arthritis in *Healthy People 2010*.

COLLEGE ALCOHOL ABUSE

Drinking by college students aged 18-24 contributes to an estimated 1,400 student deaths, 500,000 injuries, and 70,000 cases of sexual assault or date rape each year. In addition, more than one-fourth of college students have driven in the past year while under the influence of alcohol. A task force, convened by NIAAA's National Advisory Council issued a report, entitled "A Call to Action: Changing the Culture of Drinking at U.S. Colleges". It outlines recommendations for college

administrators and researchers to address high-risk college drinking.

REFUGEE MENTAL HEALTH

Each year the U.S. resettles an average of 106,500 refugees in various cities throughout the country. These refugees often witnessed or experienced rape, torture, war, murder of family members, starvation or loss of property. Upon their arrival in the U.S., some states provide physical health screening to the refugees. The same attention is rarely given to their mental health needs. Research indicates that refugees are at greater risk for depression, anxiety, and posttraumatic stress disorder (PTSD) than the general U.S. population, yet they are not routinely screened. NIMH is currently funding studies on PTSD in refugees.

Among the suspected environmental factors associated with asthma, allergen sensitization has been widely implicated as one of the most important risk factors. AHRQ has recently funded a study examining racial differences to allergen sensitivities.
