It contains academic, research, and practice literature from more than 45 countries in over 30 languages. In addition to the psychological literature, PsycINFO provides materials from related fields such as medicine, psychiatry, education, social work, law, criminology, social sciences, and organizational behavior. It includes citations from journals, dissertations, book chapters, books, technical reports, and other documents from 1887 to the present.

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## ASSESSING DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

Domestic violence, a devastating problem confronting families in the U.S. today, is defined as abuse or neglect that occurs within families. Research shows that nearly 2 million women are reported to be physically assaulted by their male partners each year. One in four women will be physically abused during her lifetime. AHRQ has recently funded research that developed a new assessment tool, the domestic violence survivor assessment (DVSA). The DVSA is used to counsel battered women to effectively resolve the dilemma of their abusive relationships and take the steps necessary to live free of abuse.

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## COCAINE DEPENDENCE

Cocaine is one of a group of dopamine re-uptake inhibitor drugs. Because the parts of the brain that control mood can rely on dopamine-mediated nerve cells, cocaine's use as a mood enhancer may create dependency. Statistics from emergency departments show that cocaine mentions have increased 10% in the last year. Consequently, complications of cocaine use continues to be scrutinized for the drug's long-term effect on the brain and central nervous system. NIDA is currently funding research on cocaine dependence from a biological perspective.

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## ERECTILE DYSFUNCTION

Erectile dysfunction (ED) is the inability to achieve and maintain an adequate erection for sexual activity. Over 30 million men in the U.S. are affected by this disorder. Causes of ED include diabetic nerve damage, cardiovascular disorders, injuries to the spinal cord, hormonal disorders, and substance abuse. NCHS has collected data on ED in its National Ambulatory Medical Care Survey.

## HEALTH CENTERS

HRSA oversees the Consolidated Health Center Program which funds a national network of community health centers, migrant health centers, health care for the homeless centers, public housing primary care centers, and school-based health centers. The centers serve patients regardless of their ability to pay. Fees are set according to income and are not collected from the poorest clients. Through additional grants, these centers will expand services to provide greater access to medical,

dental, mental health, and substance abuse treatment in rural and inner-city areas.

## MENTAL HEALTH PARITY

Insurance plans often place greater restrictions on the treatment of mental disorders than on the treatment of other medical illnesses. As a result, some of the mentally ill are unable to get effective mental health treatment. In the early 1990's, supporters of the mentally ill began to advocate for mental health parity; that is, make health insurance coverage for mental health conditions equal to that for physical health conditions. In response, Congress passed the Mental Health Parity Act of 1996,

effective January 1, 1998, that created equality between the annual and lifetime dollar limits for mental health benefits and those for medical and surgical benefits. This legislation, due to expire on September 30, 2001, was extended until the end of 2002. Unless Congress passes new legislation to continue the provisions of the Mental Health Parity Act of 1996, the benefits of the act will cease at the end of 2002. NIMH is currently funding research on mental health parity for children.

The Scope of the collection includes the delivery of health care, health administration, health policy, health services research, health promotion and disease prevention, computer sciences, management sciences, medical sociology, health statistics, international health, epidemiology, public health, mental health, psychiatry and neurology, and substance abuse.

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
