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ANTIPSYCHOTIC MEDICATION FOR THE TREATMENT OF SCHIZOPHRENIA

Initial research on the treatment of schizophrenia found that typical antipsychotics treated the positive symptoms of this disorder but were less effective in treating the negative symptoms. In addition, these drugs produced side effects such as extrapyramidal symptoms (EPS) and hyperprolactinemia. In the mid 1990s, atypical antipsychotics were introduced for the treatment of schizophrenia because they produced significantly less EPS and hyperprolactinemia than the typical antipsychotics. However, unwanted side effects such as weight gain and somnolence resulted from their use. Currently under investigation are novel antipsychotics that have been found to reduce liability for inducing EPS and may offer improved outcomes in core negative symptoms, affective symptoms, and cognitive functioning. NIMH is currently funding comparative studies on the efficacy of the different types of antipsychotic medications in the treatment of schizophrenia.

DRUGGED DRIVING

Over 8 million persons aged 12 or older, or 3.6% of the U.S. population, reported driving under the influence of illegal drugs in 2001. This figure represents a greater than 3% increase over the previous year. The data is based on information obtained from the 2001 National Household Survey on Drug Abuse, an annual survey sponsored by SAMHSA that interviewed 69,000 people in their homes.

IRON DEFICIENCY

Iron is a mineral found in the body that is essential for good health as well as for mental and physical well-being. Iron deficiency, the most common nutritional deficiency worldwide, occurs when the body does not have enough iron to produce red blood cells. Preschool children and women who are pregnant, lactating or who experience heavy menstrual losses are at risk for iron deficiency. Eating an iron-rich diet or taking iron supplements helps to prevent iron deficiency. NCHS has published data on iron deficiency in the National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey.
