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## BLOOD-BORNE INFECTIONS AND DRUG USE

The implementation of successful programs to reduce the incidence of blood-borne infections in injection drug users (IDUs) continues to be studied. HHS recommends that all IDUs who continue to inject drugs use a new sterile needle for each injection. Needle exchange programs (NEPs) have repeatedly been demonstrated to be beneficial to IDUs but their impact has been limited by a lack of federal funding. No studies have shown that NEPs increase existing drug use or lead to initiation of drug use. Using pharmacies as legal providers of needles is considered by some as a legitimate medical way of allowing health care professionals to assist in the prevention of blood-borne disease in IDUs.

## COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH

Deinstitutionalization of the chronically mentally ill and legislation to create community mental health centers launched the beginning of community mental health in the early 1960s. Initial emphases which was often in the form of alternative community-based methods of treatment for the severely mentally ill were followed by programs aimed at early detection and intervention. Eventually programs that intervened to reduce the incidence of mental disorder within population groups, settings, or communities were developed and implemented. The evolution of community mental health continues today with programs that foster the development of healthy environments to encourage positive mental health and the promotion of well-being. SAMHSA is currently funding the Comprehensive Community Mental Health Services Program for Children and Their Families, a program designed to deliver comprehensive individualized mental health services in the community for children with serious emotional disturbance and their families.

CDC's National Center for Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Promotion studies the causes of these diseases, supports programs to promote healthy behaviors, conducts and monitors health through surveys, and partners with state health agencies and others to create a healthier nation.

## LABOR INDUCTION

Labor induction is an obstetric intervention that physicians use to avoid pregnancy complications such as pre-eclampsia, post-term pregnancy, and fetal compromise. It is performed by using oxytocin to induce contractions or by rupturing the membranes that hold the amniotic fluid. Over the past decade, the rate of labor inductions in the U.S. has doubled partially because there has been an increase in elective labor inductions. NCHS has published data on this intervention in the National Vital Statistics Report, Vol.47, No. 27, 1999.

## QUALITY OF HOSPITAL EMERGENCY CARE

Hospital emergency care occurs in a high-volume, highly complex environment that is prone to medical errors and health quality concerns. Emergency department (ED) physicians must often make rapid, life-altering medical decisions with little knowledge about the health background of the patient. Research suggests that developing effective reporting systems that could help reduce ED medical errors; examining areas of high risk for errors within the ED; using error analysis tools to learn from errors; and making emergency care more patient-centered would improve ED quality of care and patient safety. AHRQ has recently funded several studies on the quality of hospital emergency care.
