## ADOLESCENT SUICIDE ATTEMPTS

Adolescent suicide attempts are a significant public health problem in the U.S. The rates of suicide attempts by adolescents are steadily increasing making suicide the third leading cause of mortality among 13-19 year olds. Factors that contribute to adolescent suicide attempts include depression, substance abuse, low self-esteem, hopelessness, and family conflict/disruption. For adolescent suicide attempters, more active follow-up and adequate aftercare are needed if repetition and risk of suicide are to be reduced. NIMH is currently funding research to determine trends in adolescent suicide attempts by race and gender.

## NICOTINE'S DOUBLE EFFECT ON DOPAMINE

In addition to directly stimulating the brain's reward system by triggering the release of dopamine, nicotine also stimulates the brain indirectly by altering the balance of inputs from two types of neurons that help regulate its activity level. This additional stimulation intensifies and sustains the pleasure of smoking. NIDA research has found a sustained increase in the ventral tegmental area of the brain's glutamate-to-GABA ratio. Nicotine induces long-term potentiation in glutamate-producing cells which promotes high-level activity for an extended period of time. After a brief initial increase, the drug also produces a decrease in GABA transmission for approximately one hour. NIDA research suggests that the combination of increasing dopamine release and decreasing the inhibitory (GABA) response results in an amplification of the rewarding properties of nicotine and adds another piece to the puzzle of what makes nicotine so addictive.

## SECONDHAND SMOKE AND TOOTH DECAY IN CHILDREN

Secondhand smoke is defined as tobacco smoke that is exhaled by a smoker or given off by burning tobacco and inhaled by persons nearby. A recently funded AHRQ study shows that young children who are exposed to secondhand smoke have a much higher rate of tooth decay than children who do not grow up around smokers. This study is the first in the U.S. that associates secondhand smoking with tooth decay, a public health problem costing Americans an estimated \$4.5 billion annually.

## SUDDEN INFANT DEATH SYNDROME

Sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS) or crib death is defined as the unexpected, sudden death of an infant under one year old in which an autopsy does not provide an explainable cause of death. Research has shown that placing infants on their backs when they sleep reduces the likelihood of SIDS. As a result, the incidence of SIDS has decreased over 40% dropping it from the 2nd to the 3rd leading cause of death in infants between 1 month and 1 year of age.
