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ATTENTION-DEFICIT HYPERACTIVITY DISORDER AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE

It is estimated that over 2 million American children have been diagnosed with attention-deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD). The standard treatment for this disorder continues to be psychostimulant medications such as Ritalin (methylphenidate or MPH). Some studies have linked ADHD with the development of substance use, abuse or dependence (SU/A/D) in adolescents and adults. Two NIDA-sponsored studies have investigated the possible protective effect of MPH against SU/A/D in rats. Both studies have shown that rats exposed to MPH early in life spent less time seeking cocaine than did rats unexposed to the stimulant. More research is needed to determine whether neurobiological results seen in rats might be relevant to humans.

DEPRESSION IN MEN

Although men are often perceived to be immune from depression, there is mounting evidence that depression in men is a serious and potentially fatal condition. Lack of effective diagnosis and treatment often leads to suicide, substance abuse, interpersonal conflicts, and acting out behavior patterns. Because cultural conditioning discourages the expression of depression in men, fewer men than women seek help for this disorder. As a result, many who are depressed remain unidentified, undiagnosed, and untreated. NIMH is currently funding research on depression in gay men.

MRI FOR CANCER-RELATED LOW BACK PAIN

Magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) is a noninvasive diagnostic technique that produces computerized images of internal body tissues. It is based on nuclear magnetic resonance of atoms within the body induced by the application of radio waves. Medical research reveals that cancer is not a very common cause of low back pain (LBP). A recent study funded by AHRQ indicates that the few back cancer cases detected with MRI do not justify the cost of routine MRI among LBP patients.

Recently, additional funds have been provided to help hospitals that are interested in being certified as Critical Care Access Hospitals upgrade their quality of care and improve their emergency medical services. In addition, these grants will provide technical assistance to rural and frontier communities as well as coordinate statewide rural health activities and cost-based reimbursements.

TUBERCULOSIS

Tuberculosis (TB), an airborne infection caused by the bacterium *Mycobacterium tuberculosis*, primarily affects the lungs but can attack almost any part of the body. Due to improved TB control programs, the rate of reported cases has dropped 47% between 1992 and 2001. The 2001 number of new TB cases in the U.S. is 15,989 which represents the lowest rate for reported cases since national surveillance began in 1953. NCHS has data on TB in *Healthy People 2010*.
