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Web of Science (WOS)

The Parklawn Health Library has access to two of WOS's databases, Social Science Citation Index (SSCI) and Science Citation Index Expanded (SCI). Both are available at <http://publishorperish.nih.gov/>. SSCI's coverage includes subjects such as psychiatry, psychology, public health, social issues, social work, sociology, substance abuse, and women's studies. SCI's coverage includes subjects such as medicine, neuroscience, pediatrics, and psychiatry. Although the main purpose of these databases is to search for cited works, you can also search as you would any other database. Coverage is from 1980 - present.

Porpoise is a research update service based on the WOS. You can set up search profiles to be searched against the weekly updates of SCI and SSCI databases. Also, you can stay abreast of what is being published in your areas of interest, track publications by your colleagues and/or receive the table of contents for the latest issue of a journal(s).

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ADOLESCENT BULLYING

Whether it's called bullying or teasing, its effects can be devastating to the lives of its adolescent victims and its perpetrators. Studies have shown, and real life experience has proven, that bullying and being bullied can result in poor mental health and violent behavior. Evidence-based knowledge has shown that parents who spend at least 15 minutes a day with their children can have a positive effect on their children's behavior. This is the core principle of SAMHSA's bullying prevention campaign, *15+ Make Time to Listen, Take Time to Talk...About Bullying*, to be launched in 2004. This campaign expands a series of talking campaigns which began in the fall of 2000.

ALCOHOL AND NATIVE AMERICANS

The use of alcohol by Native Americans is a major health concern in Native American communities throughout the U.S. The high mortality rate from alcoholism has made it one of the leading causes of death for this group. Alcohol-related deaths are also high. In addition, alcohol use is linked to a variety

of health problems found in the Native American population. The Indian Health Service has established the Alcohol and Substance Abuse Program whose mission is to eliminate the disease of alcoholism and other drug dependencies and the associated pain they bring to individuals, families, villages, communities, and tribes.

HEALTH DISPARITIES AND CULTURAL COMPETENCE

Racial and ethnic minorities tend to receive a lower quality of health care than whites. Stereotyping, biases, and uncertainty on the part of health care providers contribute to this unequal treatment. In

addition, providers may not order appropriate tests for medical interventions because of cross-cultural misunderstandings. Conversely, patients from these groups may choose not to seek needed services for fear of being misunderstood or disrespected. They may also not adhere to medical advice because they do not understand or trust the provider. Thus, ignoring culture often leads to negative health consequences. Culturally competent care from providers can have a positive impact on clinical outcomes for this population. HRSA's Division of Clinical Quality targets the issues of health disparities and cultural competence among vulnerable populations.

KAWASAKI SYNDROME

Kawasaki syndrome (KS), also known as mucocutaneous lymph node syndrome, affects the mucous membranes, the skin, and the lymph nodes. Although U.S. children of Asian descent have a higher

incidence of KS, it can affect all racial and ethnic groups. 80% of the affected children are under 4 years old with most cases of the disease occurring between the ages of 18 months and 2 years. Complications from KS can cause damaging effects on the heart and coronary arteries, making it the leading cause of noncongenital heart disease among U.S. children. AHRQ has recently funded a study which indicates that the incidence rate for KS has not markedly changed in the U.S. over the past decade.
