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ProQuest

The Parklawn Health Library subscribes to several electronic journal packages, one of which is ProQuest. Our [primary clients](#) have access to this database right from their desktop. [ProQuest](#), which includes numerous full text journals, consists of five major collections:

**Health and Medical** (partially full text) covers over 380 leading health and medical journals in key medical specialties. It is designed to serve a wide range of people from hospital administrators to medical professionals and consumers. Coverage includes 1987 to present.

**Medline** is the National Library of Medicine’s premier bibliographic database on bioscience and life sciences. Although this database does not provide full text, it will link to the full text of some articles within ProQuest and other selected databases. Coverage begins in 1966.

**National News Abstracts** (non full text) provides citations and abstracts to 3 major newspapers, New York Times, USA Today, and Wall Street Journal. Coverage varies.

**ProQuest Psychology** (full text) covers key psychology and related publications from 1992 to the present.

**Research Library** (partially full text) provides information (scholarly, popular, etc.) across a broad range of subject areas from 1971 to the present.

## CO-OCCURRING SUBSTANCE ABUSE AND MENTAL HEALTH DISORDERS

According to SAMHSA's latest household survey, nearly 4 million Americans have co-occurring serious mental illness and substance abuse problems. The total figure would be considerably higher if it included those with less severe mental or substance use problems. SAMHSA has recently announced a new technical assistance center and help line to support state efforts to provide treatment services for those persons with co-occurring substance abuse and mental disorders. The Co-Occurring Center for Excellence will help identify best practices for treating co-occurring substance abuse and mental disorders and will support the application of these practices through technical assistance and cross-training, state of the art materials, and a web site.

### FAMILY CAREGIVERS

There are more than 6 million adults in the U.S. that provide long-term unpaid care to disabled elderly persons in their families. While this service saves the health care system billions of dollars each year, it comes at the price of severe emotional distress, social isolation, and depression among caregivers. In addition, they are at an increased risk for psychiatric and physical disease. Social support, however, has the ability to moderate the demands of family caregiving. AoA's National Family Caregiver Support Program provides individual counseling, information to caregivers about available services, assistance in gaining access to these services, and organization of support groups and caregiver training.

Heritable diseases are passed from parents to children. However, many of these disorders are treatable if detected early. Recently HHS established a new Advisory Committee on Heritable Disorders and Genetic Diseases in Newborns and Children to consider the most appropriate application of universal screening tests, technologies and guidelines. In addition, the committee will make recommendations to help states and local public health agencies improve screening, counseling, and health care services to newborns and children who have or are at risk for heritable disorders.
