CARDIOVASCULAR DISEASE IN NATIVE AMERICANS

Cardiovascular disease (CVD) was thought to be rare among Native Americans until the Strong Heart Study, a longitudinal study of CVD and its risk factors in Native Americans, showed that a high prevalence of CVD and CVD risk factors existed among 13 Native American communities in 3 geographic areas. Today, CVD is the leading cause of death among the Native American population. Since a high prevalence of modifiable cardiovascular risk factors, such as obesity and smoking, are present in Native American communities, there is a great need to aggressively manage them through professional counseling, patient awareness, and lifestyle modification. The IHS is currently sponsoring the Native American Cardiology Program which promotes cardiovascular health and wellness through state-of-the-art treatment, education, and prevention for Native American patients throughout the Southwest.

CHILD TRAUMATIC STRESS

Trauma in childhood may result from a number of events or circumstances. Some of these are: being a victim of a crime, experiencing psychological or physical abuse, witnessing family violence, experiencing a traumatic accident or injury, or experiencing a natural disaster or war. Treatment and intervention for such children is necessary to prevent future psychological difficulties. SAMHSA has funded the National Resource Center for Child Traumatic Stress (www.nctsnet.org) which has an easy-to-navigate web site with information and resources for counselors, families, and others seeking to understand and treat child traumatic stress.

YOUTH BULLYING

The impact of bullying on children's success in school and personal well-being is tremendous. One in four children who are bullies will have a criminal record by the age of 30. Research shows that people who bully others often behave badly in school and are more likely to smoke, drink alcohol, and receive lower grades. HRSA's "Take A Stand. Lend a Hand. Stop Bullying Now!" program is designed to stop bullying and includes verbal or physical harassment that occurs repeatedly over time or is intended to cause harm.
