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HIV AIDS TREATMENT ADHERENCE HEALTH OUTCOME AND COST STUDY

This study is a collaborative project of SAMHSA, HRSA's HIV AIDS Bureau, and NIDA. It assesses integrated treatment interventions for dually-diagnosed individuals living with HIV/AIDS. Its purpose is to determine treatment adherence, health outcomes, and costs associated with providing mental health, substance abuse disorders, and HIV/AIDS primary care services for individuals living with HIV/AIDS who also have both a mental and substance abuse disorder.

INHALANT ABUSE

The use of inhalants, also called “huffing” or “sniffing”, involves snorting or inhaling chemical vapors from spray paint, glue or cleaning products to achieve a high sensation. Data from the 2002 National Survey on Drug Use and Health show that inhalant use is increasing among teenagers. The survey, sponsored by SAMHSA, also shows that inhalant abuse appears to peak at age 14 or 15 and that nearly 5 percent of that age group have used inhalants in the past 12 months.

PRIMARY HEALTH CARE

Primary health care was defined by the World Health Organization in 1978 as a level of health service delivery as well as an approach to health care practice. Primary care, as the provision of basic or general health care for all ages and for both genders, includes care for self-limited problems or injuries,

the care of chronic diseases, the provision of preventive care, and health education. Primary care physicians in the U.S. consist of family or general practice physicians, general internists, general pediatricians, nurse practitioners, and physician assistants. HRSA's Bureau of Primary Health Care works to increase access to comprehensive primary and preventive health care and to improve the health status of underserved and vulnerable populations.
